

# Marlborough Residents' Survey for Local Alcohol Policy

#### **Marlborough Survey for Local Alcohol Policy**

In conjunction with Tasman District Council and Nelson City Council, Marlborough District Council developed a survey to gain residents' views on how alcohol is sold in Marlborough. The results from this survey will be used to provide information for the development of a Local Alcohol Policy (LAP) for the Marlborough District.


This survey was sent to 2002 randomly selected Marlborough residents, representing 6% of the number of residents in Marlborough. The survey was open for two weeks and 642 surveys were returned during this period (a 32% return rate). A further 53 surveys were returned after the closing date from randomly selected participants and 36 surveys from other participants who chose to participate in the survey from Council's Website. The results provided below only include the randomly selected surveys returned within the time frame given. The further surveys received will be also taken into consideration when drafting the LAP.


It is worth noting that over 40% of our respondents were aged 65 or older however results were fairly consistent throughout all age groups.

#### **Key Findings**


- 56% of participants feel that alcohol is a problem in Marlborough.
- Three quarters of respondents believe that there is a problem with youth and drinking in Marlborough.
- The majority (98%) thought there are enough licensed premises in Marlborough with most people (77%) not wanting any more licensed premises.
- One third of participants thought there were too many off-licences.
- The majority of respondents (79%) thought there should be restriction on the proximity of licensed premises to early childhood centres, schools, parks and playgrounds, and drug and rehabilitation services.
- The majority of respondents (87%) want Council to take into consideration the number of licences already issued when considering a new application.
- Views were varied in terms of the times on-licensed premises should stop selling alcohol
  however there was a pattern of respondents saying that pubs/nightclubs should be able
  to sell liquor later than restaurants/cafes/clubs etc.
- 91% of respondents in regard to on-licences and 99% of respondents in regard to off-licences felt that licensing hours should be consistent throughout the district.
- In the last 5 years, 19% of respondents indicated that they themselves, or someone close to them, have experienced significant harm from someone else's drinking.






Thinking about the NUMBER of places that sell alcohol across Marlborough District, please give your opinion whether there are enough or not enough premises of the following types:



Do you think the Marlborough District Licensing Committee should consider the number of existing places that sell alcohol when an application for a new licence is made?



Which part of Marlborough District do you live in?



Thinking about the NUMBER of places that sell alcohol in the area or neighbourhood where you live, please give your opinion whether there are enough or not enough premises of the following types:


 Places where alcohol can be purchased and consumed on the premises with a meal, such as restaurants or cafes




 Places where alcohol can be purchased and consumed on the premises such as bars, pubs or nightclubs



 Places where alcohol can be purchased and taken away such as liquor stores, supermarkets or local grocery stores




 Other places that sell alcohol such as sports clubs, workingmen's clubs, RSA, buses, boats or winery/cellar doors




Are there any other areas in Marlborough District where you think NO MORE places that sell alcohol should be allowed to open?



Do you think there should be restrictions on how close a place whose main business is selling alcohol (such as pubs, bars, liquor stores) can be to the following types of places?



What time do you think the following types of ON-LICENCES should be required to STOP SELLING alcohol at the end of the day?



Do you think the hours you've given in the previous question should apply across the whole district?




What time do you think the following types of OFF-LICENCES should be required to STOP SELLING alcohol at the end of the day?




#### Question 11

Do you think the hours you've given in the previous question should apply across the whole region?




To what extent do you agree or disagree that one-way door restrictions should be required in bars and pubs in Marlborough District?

If a one-way door policy were to operate, what time would you set as the time when new people could not enter bars?



#### Which of the following age groups do you belong to?






Question 17
