Taylor Dam closed to vehicles following damage during lockdown

The gates to Blenheim's Taylor Dam have been locked to vehicles following significant damage to the dam's grassed area on, or around, the evening of Monday 30 August during Level 4 lockdown.

Council's Parks and Open Spaces Manager. Jane Tito, says a vehicle or vehicles have pushed through the wooden barriers to the Taylor Dam's lower picnic area, below the toilets, and caused extensive damage.

"At the same time as the grass damage was discovered, a seriously injured black swan was also found by a member of the public The bird's injuries were consistent with being hit by a car and sadly it had to be put down by a vet," Ms Tito said

Due to the current Covid restrictions repairs to the area cannot be carried out until a move to Alert Level 2. This means the gate at the top of the dam on Taylor Pass Road will be closed for the foreseeable future

Ms Tito said sadly the actions of a small minority have impacted on the majority with the dam now off limits to vehicles. A full assessment of the damage, and the cost of repairs, is yet to be determined by Council's Parks and Open Spaces team. Preservation of life, access, then restoration, the focus of recovery efforts

Safety must come first.

That's the message being delivered loud and clear from those working hard to re-connect Marlborough Sounds and Awatere Valley communities still isolated after the July 17 storm in Marlborough.

Marlborough Roads Recovery Manager Steve Murrin said access could not be restored until safety thresholds were met.

"Once we meet these safety requirements then we can progress access. We are still in response mode in parts of the Marlborough region, particularly in the Marlborough Sounds," he said

"Safety is an issue, for the public and for our work crews. Until we have confidence that a road is safe, we cannot open it. even for restricted access. Just because someone can drive on a road, this does not make it safe."

"Queen Charlotte Drive, Kenepuru Road and its many side roads, and the Awatere Valley Road are still fragile. Our priorities as a roading recovery team are preservation of life, then access, then restoration," said Mr Murrin.

Nearly 200 residents, property owners and businesses affected by the current closure of the Kenepuru Road, and its many associated side roads, dialled in to a Zoom meeting last Friday to hear the latest information available

Marlborough District Council concerned at speed of **RMA** reform

A submission by Marlborough District Council on the Exposure Draft of the Natural & Built Environments Bill (NBA) has expressed concern at the pace and scale of the reform

The Council is one of a number around the country to submit on the draft bill to the **Environment Select Committee. Mayor John** Leggett and key Council staff spoke to the submission last week in front of the Select

Mayor Leggett said the Council was concerned at the pace of the reform given that it was a major overhaul of the existing

"There needs to be education of all participants in the resource management system to ensure that the extent of the change is well understood. Otherwise, the implementation will fail," he said.

"There also needs to be sufficient time to transition from the current planning and management regime to that which is ultimately contained within the NBA. We are already navigating the Three Waters Reform which, regardless of the outcome, creates disruption in local government and will undoubtedly have an effect on each council's ability to implement a new planning regime," he said.

The Council has also made it clear to the Select Committee that it does not support a single combined plan for the Top of the South/Te Tau Ihu, as suggested by the Randerson Report. "There was neither justification nor analysis for this proposal within the report itself, a matter that has been raised directly with the Minister," said Mayor Leagett.

Marlborough District Council, as a unitary authority, has the responsibilities of both a regional and a local council. Its Proposed Marlborough Environment Plan, publicly notified in 2016, is a combined regional policy statement, a regional coastal plan, a regional plan and a district plan all in one.

"This plan structure is unique in the country." We know that this style of integrated planning has benefits for our community to simplify planning and reduce costs, and to improve outcomes for the environment," said Mayor Leggett.

"We do not have any shared freshwater catchments. We have two alpine mountain ranges and a lot of land on our boundary that is managed by the Department of Conservation. There is next to no combined use of resources between us and Nelson/ Tasman," said Mayor Leggett.
