Changes for Interislander foot passengers and works update

This month the new temporary terminal for Interislander foot passengers and cyclists opens for business.

If you fancy a sneak preview and chat with the team, please wander down today, Wed 7 June between 12pm and 1.30pm for a free sausage sizzle (see page 3). You will find us across the road from Picton i-SITE.

Terminal works update

Port Marlborough's work on building two new commercial jetties is going well. The preconstructed jetties have been towed via barge around to their new site adjacent to the "old float plane office" on the northern side of the Edwin Fox building (above image).

Nearby in the upper carpark, the iReX construction team is working on a section of the Waitohi Awa Culvert to create more capacity and make it stronger.

Dublin Street update

Currently a 'no parking' area has been set up as the team gets ready to relocate the last lot of pipes running alongside the road.

From early August Dublin Street and Broadway will close to complete the work involved in relocating pipes, and begin main works construction for the overbridge. Dublin Street and Broadway will remain closed for approximately 18 months while we complete the work. Detours with good signage will be in place well ahead of the closure.

Work on the Interislander Terminal Redevelopment is taking off. This is all about getting things ready for main work construction that will start later this year, and the arrival in 2025 of the first of two purpose built ferries. The new hybrid diesel-electric ships produce less wake energy than the current fleet, and will reduce carbon emissions by 40 percent.





Picton Rail and Sail

May round up

At Picton-On-Sea we welcome all rail and sail enthusiasts, young and old, but regardless of age, there is always a fascination with railway stories – not just about our locos and model train set-up, but also questions like "what happens to old trains, unused tunnels and disestablished train tracks?" Here's a bit of information about a few interesting "redeployments."

In the 1960s, Dr Beeching (British Railways Board Director) ordered the disestablishment many unprofitable train routes. Leicester City's Central Station got the axe in 1966. Years later, the beautiful classic building was re-purposed into a "leisure and entertainment centre" where people can meet, dine out, see movies or enjoy a drink at the Railway Pub. Former passengers go bowling on what was the station's Grand Concourse (below).



Another re-purposed railway facility is the Catesby Tunnel, 50km south of Leicester in the English Midlands. The laser-straight 2.7km railway tunnel has been converted into a racing car speed test laboratory. The double-width tunnel has a controlled temperature and atmosphere with no crosswinds, and an ultra-smooth, dead-level tarmac surface. This makes it the ideal place for speed testing F1 racing cars and even the more modest family saloon cars. Some reach 300 kph in complete safety,



and hidden away from rival manufacturers.


The railway line at Ruddington was super busy during 1940-1945 when the British Ministry of Defence built a munitions factory there, safely distant from any houses. At its wartime peak, 4000 people workers on three x 8-hour shifts, seven days a week, made bombs and assorted ammunition in 200 separate buildings (below).




The site at Ruddington was chosen because of its extensive railway connections. Workers (mostly women from nearby Leicester) came to and from work by train. Raw materials such as coal, saltpetre, gunpowder etc came in by train and the completed ordnance was railed to armed forces camps and naval ports around UK. The site continued right through WWII, scaling back after the war ended, but the facility did not close permanently until 1985, when all the buildings were demolished and the land returned to farming.

Closer to home, we have countless examples of old railway stations being turned into eateries (Picton's Subway and Blenheim's Wine Station are our "locals") and of course The Forgotten Highway and the Otago Rail Trail are just two of many old tracks that have been given new leases of life.



That's because the official celebration is typically held in the British summer when there is a greater chance of good weather for the accompanying grand parade, known as Trooping the Colour.







archaeological digs have discovered that the most popular meats served up were pork and beef.

We have some lovely children's books – in both Maori and English (\$20 each) and a really






Marlborough secures road recovery funding

Marlborough District Council has been successful in its bid to gain further central Government funding to help repair its storm-damaged roads. Two heavy rain events in

July 2021 and August 2022 caused extensive damage across its network running into the hundreds of millions of dollars.

Last week the Waka Kotahi board agreed to fund 95 per cent of \$52.39M, or \$49.77M. The Council would provide the remaining five per cent, or \$2.62M.

"This is fantastic news and I'd like to thank everyone who contributed to this outcome," Mayor Nadine Taylor said.

"Thanks in particular to Waka Kotahi for agreeing to the financial assistance rate (FAR) of 95%. I understand and appreciate the Government is under significant pressure and facing funding requests from North Island regions for the Cyclone Gabrielle recovery and rebuild."

The new funding enables Awatere Valley, Northbank and Waihopai Valley road repairs to be completed, as well as a one-year extension of barge and water taxi subsidies in the Marlborough Sounds. The new money also includes funding for design for repairing high priority sites on Queen Charlotte Drive, and costs for some repairs in the Sounds that are necessary to maintain access, prior to the outcome of the Marlborough Sounds Future Access Study.

"This is great news for our communities. There is however some way to go with the next round of public engagement Council is conducting on the Marlborough Sounds Future Access Study coming up at the end of this month, when we will be seeking public feedback on the 'emerging preferred option' for each of the five damaged areas in the Sounds."

Go to further information on the Study and the drop-in and online meetings taking place from 20 to 28 June.

Previous funding allocations of \$85.3M and \$3.45M were provided at a 95% FAR by Waka Kotahi, bringing Marlborough's total storm recovery funding to date to \$141.14M.

Marlborough Matariki Event Fund open for applications

Are you part of an organisation planning to hold an event to recognise Te Rā Aro ki a Matariki?

Marlborough District Council is seeking applications for the Mānawatia te Kahui o Matariki Fund which celebrates and supports the regeneration and sustainability of mātauranga Māori associated with Te Kāhui o Matariki.

Councillor Jonathan Rosene, who will chair the decision-making panel awarding the funding, said the fund is a great way of elevating the importance of Māori culture and heritage within our community.

"I welcome the opportunity to chair this panel which will see Matariki stories and events come to life in Marlborough. These events will provide a platform for our community to learn more about Māori and share in the importance of Matariki," he said.

Council's Arts Culture and Heritage Project Lead, Nicola Neilson said the contestable fund, which is now open for applications, aims to support the community in hosting events that



recognise not only Te Rā Aro ki a Matariki, the public holiday, but also the wider kaupapa and principles of Matariki.

"The fund will support costs integral to holding an event, which includes venue and equipment hire, marketing and promotion and other costs," she said. While there is no maximum that can be applied for, it's likely between \$2000 and \$3000 will be awarded to support events.

Mrs Neilson said priority will be given to events that can demonstrate documented support from iwi.

Future Marlborough Sounds transport network engagement starts 20 June

The next phase of public engagement for the Marlborough Sounds Future Access Study starts on 20 June. The public will be asked for their views on an 'emerging preferred option' for each of the five storm-damaged areas of the Sounds. Information on other possible options will also be made available at next month's meetings and online.

From 20 to 28 June, seven community dropin sessions will be held in Blenheim, Picton, around the Sounds and in Nelson. There will also be an online webinar for people who live outside Marlborough or who can't make one of the drop-in meetings. A survey will seek the public's input, with feedback due by 11 July.

Council embarked on the study to support the case for funding safe and resilient long-term access solutions for the Sounds, both for itself and to obtain funding assistance from Waka Kotahi.

Mayor Nadine Taylor said this next phase of engagement follows eight months of technical analysis by engineering consultancy Stantec and community feedback from stakeholders and Sounds' landowners, homeowners and businesses, garnered from a survey in February.

"Based on this analysis and feedback, Council and Stantec have identified an emerging preferred option for the five areas in the Sounds that includes building back roads and also considers improved marine access options."

"Stakeholder and public feedback will also be sought for an alternative, climate-resilient option for each area that is a combination of short-term actions and longer-term options in case we get more major weather events." "The harsh reality is we need a transport system that can cope with the damaging impacts of climate change, sea level rise and earthquakes, well into the future."

"The drop-in sessions and survey are for everyone with an interest in our Marlborough Sounds transport network to provide their views."

"Once we have completed this second round of engagement, Waka Kotahi will be able to consider all the analysis and feedback in our business case and make their decisions, which will include how much funding they will be able to provide or request from the Government."

"I know that Sounds residents have been living with damaged roads since mid-2021 and want clarity about what is happening in the short, medium and long term. We are getting closer to that with this second round of public discussion on the preferred and alternative options."

"The options being presented will have high-level cost estimates that cover repairs from the August 2022 event, capital improvements and ongoing maintenance costs. What we won't know at this stage is the funding mix between Government and Council, but as there will be a significant impact on rates, we will be asking both Sounds residents and Marlborough ratepayers as a whole what they might be willing to pay for a resilient transport network in the Sounds."

"I encourage people to come to a drop-in session to find out more and then to provide their views through the survey."

"Following this engagement and any

decisions by Waka Kotahi, Council will reassess its preferred options and undertake a special consultation process under the Local Government Act on those and proposed funding before making final decisions."

Updated: Submissions to open on Marlborough's navigation bylaw

Council is replacing its 2009 Navigation Bylaw.

The new bylaw will have minor amendments to address key issues and improve clarity Harbourmaster Captain Jake Oliver said.

At last week's Council meeting Captain Oliver presented a thorough report on the proposed replacement navigation bylaw which will go out for consultation next month.

Submissions are expected to open on 15 June 2023 and close on 1 October 2023 with a sub-committee being formed, if necessary, to deliberate on submissions.

Marlborough's current Navigation Bylaw came into force in July 2010 and contains rules relating to maritime and navigation safety. It helps with the regulation of shipping and activities on the waters of the region.

Under the Maritime Transport Act regional councils can make bylaws to regulate and control activities and prevent nuisances arising. This includes controlling anchorages, placement and maintenance of moorings and specifying requirements for carrying and using of lifejackets on boats.

A review of the bylaw began in 2017 but was not completed due to issues arising from the emergence of the iRex ferries project and subsequent delays due to Covid.

Proposed changes to the bylaw include correcting information relating to the working channel for Picton Harbour Radio, incorporating water ski access lanes not currently included, updating fees and charges levied on activities and editing changes to improve the bylaw's readability.

There are areas of the bylaw that will need greater attention and in-depth consultation with operators and the community Captain Oliver said.

"These will be pursued as amendments at a later date and are anticipated to include requirements on wearing lifejackets, carrying communications, vessel identification, AIS (automatic identification system), common passage plans and commercial shipping operations," he said.

Make your artistic mark on Marlborough

Applications open soon for the Chorus cabinet art project which aims to promote artwork in the community, encourage artists to show their skills and brighten up neighbourhoods.

The art initiative began in Auckland in 2010 to reduce vandalism to telecommunications cabinets. It proved so successful it was extended throughout the country and more than 100 murals are completed each year. Council has teamed up with Chorus to run and promote the project in Marlborough.

Local artist Charlotte Buskin, 22, has painted two cabinets in Hospital Road and Percy Street and plans to apply again.

The self-taught, full-time artist says she is surrounded by creative people in her family and has painted ever since she can remember, and began selling her art when she was 12. "I'm particularly inspired by nature and I love painting native birds," she said.

Painted cabinets caught Charlotte's eye and when she saw one underway she approached the artist to find out more.

"She put me on to the website and so I submitted a design which was accepted," she said.

Artists are paid for their materials and time and Charlotte encourages other budding and

established artists to submit, describing it as a very rewarding project to be involved with.

Applications will be assessed by a Cabinet Art committee including Councillors Jonathan Rosene and Barbara Faulls, two Council staff and two community representatives.

Sites in Picton, Waikawa, Renwick, Grovetown and Blenheim have been identified for the 2023/2024 year.

Home fires main source of Picton emissions

Strategic Planner Sarah Brand told last month's Environment and Planning Committee meeting that the purpose of an inventory is to estimate the contribution of different sources of emissions to air and evaluate changes over time.

"This is the first emission inventory for Picton,"

she said.

In 2019-2020 an air quality screening study was undertaken by NIWA following concerns expressed by the community about Picton's air quality.

Results indicated that elevated levels of

some contaminants could exceed National Environmental Standards (NES) for air quality guidelines, triggering the need to install compliant monitoring. Two sites have recently been selected and monitoring equipment has been sourced.

The inventory evaluation focuses on particulate matter (PM10 and PM2.5) and other contaminants including carbon monoxide, nitrogen oxide, sulphur oxide, volatile organic compounds and carbon dioxide. PM10 is particulate matter of 10 microns or less which can be inhaled deep into the lungs.

Emission sources included in the inventory were domestic heating, motor vehicles, port activities, industrial and commercial activities and outdoor burning.

"Domestic heating was found to be the main source of daily winter PM10 emissions in Picton accounting for 75 per cent of the daily winter PM10," Sarah said.

The next most significant contributors were outdoor burning at 12 per cent, industry at nine per cent with shipping and rail contributing six per cent.

Shipping emissions produced less than one tonne of PM10 per year - around six per cent of all emissions. The report estimated that PM10 emissions from ferries was around 0.31 tonnes, followed by recreational vessels at 0.28 tonnes.
