



What we've already lost


















"It had the sweetest song"

New Zealand Quail - Extinct by 1870




Humans have waged a war of attrition on NZ's birds

23 species became extinct after first human arrival

30 more species since European arrival

Yet we seem content to allow this to continue

Estimated rates of decline – National wader count



National Banded Dotterel Survey 2018



- Banded dotterels in steady decline
- Average -3.7% pa decline on braided rivers
- Equates to 52.3% decline over 20 years
- Unsure of how representative trends are of other habitat types
- National population in order of 20,000 mature individuals
- Banded dotterels facing numerous threats – not just on braided rivers
- Predator control programmes starting to demonstrate positive trends
