- 1. There is no Kahikatea Tree located at Te Mara in Double Bay, and the currently listing is therefore incorrect and requires deletion for the Heritage Tree Register.
- 2. It is considered that this submission remains within the scope of the Plan Change given the Plan Change notification identified the Plan Change scope as being to update of the Heritage Register.

#### The decision I seek from Council is:

1. For Planning Map Notation/Heritage Tree Listing 63 to be deleted from the Heritage Tree Register, as follows:

I support (in part) this part of the Plan Change.

My reasons for supporting (in part) this part of the plan change are:

- 1. The heritage trees proposed for protection meet the criteria for heritage tree selection, as provided in Volume 1 of the Marlborough Sounds Resource Management Plan;
- 2. However, the Heritage Register Plan text inaccurately states that tree numbers 74 and 76 are located at 11 Broadway Street, Picton, whereas they are actually located on the road reserve adjoining these allotments.
- 3. The Planning Map Page 57, 58, uses lower case text to delineate the individual trees 74a and 74b, which differs to the other Plan amendments, which is in upper case text font. This may cause unnecessary confusion for Plan users and should be changed to upper case text font

#### The decision I seek from Council is:

1. To amend the location details on the heritage tree register associated with trees 74 and 76, to state they are located on the road reserve, as identified in the text below:

I request an additional **amendment** to the Plan text of the preamble to the Heritage Tree Resister as contained in Appendix A of the Marlborough Sounds Resource Management Plan and Appendix A of the Wairau/Awatere Resource Management Plan, to further explain the system of heritage tree notation on the assoicated Planning Maps.

My reason for requesting this amendment to these parts of the plan change is:

1. Where multiple trees of the same species are identified on the Planning Maps, they are delineated on the maps using alphabetical numbering. For example, Planning Notation/Heritage Tree number 132 as contained in the Wairau/Awatere Resource Management Plan shows there are three Oak trees located on site, as depicted by 'Oak (3)' in the register. The corresponding Planning Map Pages 161 and 162, will subsequently depict these trees as being 132A, 132B and 132 C. However, the Plan text does not currently explain this alphabetical numbering system, which may confuse Plan users. The provision of additional Plan text explaining this notation system may therefore provide clarity to Plan users.

#### The decision I seek from Council is:

- 1. For the additional Plan text to be added under the title of heading 'Heritage Trees' as contained in Appendix A of each Plan.
  - Note: Where multiple trees of the same species are located on the same allotment, they are annotated using alphabetical numbering on the corresponding Planning Map.

As landowner of 94 Wellington St, Picton, Lot 2 DP 801 I am writing to advise that the tree in question shown on map page no 57,58 has been poisoned and is scheduled for removal.

As recorded in your notes on 17/02/09 I contacted a representative in council and advised of the situation with this tree. In brief I was advised that removal of the tree was up to me as it was on my property. Since I have owned the property I have been contacted a number of times by residents and council itself regarding pruning/removal of this tree. Negotiations to have it removed a couple of years ago stalled after council refused to pay for its removal and I did not have the funds available to have it removed at that time.

It should be noted here that the section that this tree is on is a small commercial zoned section and a tree of this size is overbearing. Council have paid for its pruning at least twice to appease its tenants in the adjacent property. It is of nuisance value in its current location.

I therefore ask that this tree be removed from the register.

#### Further Information.


The property at 8 Taranaki St, Picton was owned and developed in the early 1930's by Bob (Robert) and Beni Hance. Bob Hance grew up in Picton and was the 'son' in Millen & Son, Bakers. Prior to their marriage, his wife Beni was the teacher at the Waikawa Pa School – (listed in those days as a 'Native School'.) She had a particular interest in both Maori language & music, and New Zealand's native trees & plants.

Between them they planted a wide variety of native trees, shrubs and ferns, all of which – apart from the Kauri – they gathered from the local area around Picton and the Sounds. (No garden shops in those days!)


The Kauri was collected by Bob (1934) when, as a member of the local Fire Brigade, he took part in the Volunteer Fire Brigade Competitions held in Northland that year. He brought the seedling back in a matchbox.

Quite a number of the original trees from these plantings are still growing – now round the 55 to 70<sup>+</sup> years age, while most other natives now found on the property are progeny from those original plantings. Because the 'forest tree' types have reached a mature age they now provide high canopy areas as well as a food source for many native birds still in the area – and provide a corridor for native birds to move between their food source areas.

Seedlings from many of the trees appear regularly. Of notable interest is the fact that in 2008 Kauri seedlings first appeared. This year (2009) six Kauri seedlings have germinated and are growing successfully. Obviously the Kauri tree is now providing fertile seed, and our climate is now enabling these plants to survive in the Marlborough area.



#### 1 Introduction:

The Marlborough District Council (MDC) states that an evaluation, which has already been carried out, set out to update the Heritage Tree Register contained in Volume 2 of the Plan to include "a complete list of notable and historic trees within the region, and to provide for the protection of these trees through the Plan rules" (p1, Report for proposed plan change).

This submission contends that an evaluation of all notable and historic trees appears not to have been carried out, because possibly the oldest and grandest tree in Marlborough has been left out of the list. This has occurred in spite of at least one phone call by the submitter to the MDC (date unknown) asking that the "big Rimu" of Howden's Bush be considered as deserving of protection.

This submission will make a strong case for protection of at least this one ancient and grand Rimu, and describe the danger that it is currently in, should it not be accorded some protection.

#### 2 Howden's Bush

Howden's Bush was gifted to the Crown in about 40 years ago by Captain Howden, son of the first owner of Furneaux, a large family property in the Northeast corner of Endeavour Inlet. The original house is now known as Furneaux Lodge. In exchange for the gift of land, several sections were surveyed off, and a road reserve formed through this part of the bush. Howden's Bush is the only remnant of unlogged coastal forest in Queen Charlotte Sound (even Ship Cove was logged). Howdens' Bush is listed within the Marlborough Sounds Resource Management Plan as of national significance in terms of its ecological value, being an area of podocarp/broadleaved forest. It is considered by the Department of Conservation as "high (biodiversity/ecological) value conservation estate". Approximately 50 metres from the Queen Charlotte Track, and just beyond the back boundary of one of these sections, is the Rimu which is the subject of this submission (Grid reference 2609853E 6011796N).

#### 3 The Rimu

The tree is not noticeably different in appearance from when Cook visited this bay in 1772. Even then, the canopy would have been so striking that it would have been noticed by Cook and his crew, who released the first pigs just a few hundred yards from this tree.

The Rimu measures 6.4metres in diameter at 2metres above ground level(a diameter of 2.04metres). The canopy of the tree has a span of over 50 metres. The tree is at least 1000 years¹, and possibly up to 2000 years old. In 2002, the tree was described in terms of its size, and the potential for damage, given the increasing traffic on the Queen Charlotte Track, and the increased general knowledge of its existence so close to the Track². This tree has a large root mound, derived from decaying bark and vegetation from the tree, and which is essential to survival of the tree. It is not unsurprising that all who walk up to the tree wish to walk up the mound touch its trunk, thereby further endangering the tree's long-term survival.

The tree is dying, and will be gone in another two or three hundred years. Ancient trees are by definition dying: this is not justification to decline them protection. In Europe, trees less than half the age or size of this become national monuments.

# 4 Damage to the tree

The roots grow under one of the adjacent private sections and the branches overhang it. Thus, although the tree is in the DoC estate, it is dependent for its survival by protection from damage within the private section. Development to the boundary of this property would kill the tree. Two adjoining sections have already been clear-felled by a developer who is active in the area.

There are now far more people visiting the tree; all of the local lodges tell their guests how to find it. Most who visit the tree climb the root mound.

#### 5 Protection of the tree

For the Rimu of Howden's Bush to be protected, the circumference of its canopy, or at least its root mound, would need to be protected from further damage. We feel that listing of the tree is possibly the only option at this point to save the tree from irrevocable harm by potential development of the adjacent section, given that the MDC allows clear felling of total-cover original native forest on a residential section, as this has already occurred nearby. Some form of root mound protection, even fencing, would protect this essential part of the tree's life support system from further damage. The option of no special protection for this tree seems to be no longer possible, as the damage currently occurring will only increase as knowledge of its whereabouts becomes widespread.

Following an initial notification on 10 October 2007 regarding "9 Rutherford St.Picton", I replied by email on 16 October 2009 correcting the mis-information as follows:

Lot 3 DP 11265 is 9 Rutland Street Lot 2 DP 3209 is 12 Newgate Street Lot 1 DP 11275 is 14 Newgate Street

14 Newgate has a very large Magnolia tree 12 Newgate has a very large Michaela tree

At that time I invited you to visit the site.

I now refer you to your letter and enclosures of 24 September 2009, which is still incorrect.

Appendix A. Planning Map location 90 lists 2 x tulip trees on Lot 1 DP 3209 as 10 Newgate St. but the Map (page 58) shows 90A & 90B on Lot 2 DP 3209 which is 12 Newgate St.

That Lot 2 DP 3209 12 Newgate has only 1 large Michaela tree (and 1 large Alder) whilst Lot 1 DP 11275 14 Newgate St has 1 large Magnolia.

I think that 10 Newgate may also have a large Magnolia.

Once again, I suggest you visit the site to get it right!

Please let me know when this has been rectified.

#### Good morning Emma:

As per our phone conversation, this is a late submission regarding the Marlborough Sounds Resource Management, proposed plan change no. 8, the Heritage Tree Update.

- 1. We live at 11 Broadway Picton and my submission relates specifically to tree no 78 (page 2 of Appendix A). This was a mature lancewood which we were very fond of but which unfortunately died and then blew over in a recent storm. The good news is that there are a number of small lancewood seedlings growing in the vicinity, the largest being about 6 foot tall already. The area is actually road reserve but I look after it as it blends into our property and I am particularly fond of native trees. In addition to the large trees noted on the plan there are several small beech trees, one of which is now about 20 foot tall, which augurs well for the future.
- 2. The map which was attached is not particularly accurate as the lance wood was situated near the beech trees on Broadway near the site marked as no 77, not on the Taranaki Street reserve as shown.
- 3. In addition there is a fine mire tree, again on road reserve on the Taranaki Street frontage. I believe it should be noted on the plan as it is a fine mature specimen and I attach a photo of it for your consideration.
