A VISIT TO THE NURSERY



A visit to Morgans Road Nursery last month showed us the success the nursery is having with seeds of our native foreshore plants. Nursery owner Lee Gilbert took time out of his busy schedule to show us around. Over 700 sand tussock seedlings were well underway in their root trainers in one tunnel house, while over 350 daphne were coming along nicely in another tunnel house. Lee explained how the nursery uses all the latest available technology in their propagating house to monitor and control temperature and humidity that achieves a high success rate in cuttings and seed

germination. It was a very informative visit and our thanks to Lee for taking the time. The photo on the left shows Lee with the sand tussock seedlings—ready for Spring planting. The photo on the right shows member Dympie Swain with a mature sand tussock.

NATIVE FORESHORE PLANTS & INSECTS

NATIVE DAPHNE—Pimelea urvileana

The Pimelea family is a genus of shrubs containing more than 80 species mainly confined to Australia. A few species are found on Timor and Lord Howe Islands and the 15 New Zealand species are endemic.

The leaves are opposite or alternate, usually small. The small white flowers are perfect or unisexual in function. The perianth is tubular with 4 (usually spreading) lobes. There are 2 stamens which are inserted within the throat of the perianth tube. The fruit is small and drupe-like or dry.

This plant has been reported by J.S. Dugdale in Entomological Values of the Foreshore and Associated Inland Habitats, to be the habitat of the endemic (Cloudy Bay) Stone Moth. The following is an exert from the Study:

THE STONE MOTH —Dichromodes sp.cf. sphaeriata. The Cloudy Bay population differs from all known D. spaeriata populations in its peppering of whitish scales on the dark stone-grey forewings, and consistently smaller size; all others have these scales yellow.

like the cavalry had arrived.
They pulled and tugged as hard as they could trying to get as many plants as possible for a competition organised by member John Martin.

It was a great effort and thanks to everyone who joined in the fun There's still a few lupins left so.... we might have to have another competition!
