Confirmation of previous meeting minutes

Jon Perano/Bryan Strong: That the minutes of the meeting held on 9 July 2018 are correct.

1. Rātā Foundation Update – Matt Walters and Steve Merito

Steve and Matt are Engagement Advisors for the Rātā Foundation.
 Their roles are to engage with different organisational groups within the community. The area they cover encompasses Marlborough, Nelson/Tasman, Canterbury/Chatham Islands.



 Matt and Steve gave a presentation to the group (Appendix 1). This was the inaugural presentation of the new Powerpoint which has been updated following a strategic review of the Rātā Foundation.

- Main points outlined in the presentation follow:
 - Investing in communities has always been Rātā's main purpose and this will continue, however the
 organisation is changing from being solely a grant maker to becoming more engaged with
 community groups.
 - Annually the Rātā Foundation invests between \$15-20 million in the community. Marlborough receives 8% of the funds available.
 - One of the findings from the strategic review is that Rātā needs to be more adaptive to community needs. Matt and Steve explained how they are going to do this:

Connect: Rātā Foundation wants to be more than just about grants. The Foundation has knowledge, influence and connections to support communities. They want to build long term and lasting relationships. Matt and Steve are attending meetings such as PRF and visiting communities in order to be more connected to community. They want to understand better the projects that support the communities.

Collaborate: Building relationships and having discussions on how to collaborate to make communities better. Steve and Matt are interested in knowing about any collaborations and partnerships that are already happening in the community. Sometimes it may not be about financial investment but could be giving time to help different communities.

Transform: The Rātā Foundation is serious about seeing positive transformation happen in communities. Matt is leading a project in the top of the south on supporting groups to be good governors.

Impact Investment is about looking at providing a financial return but also a social and sustainable return in communities.

The Foundation is also interested in Special Projects which may be a collaborative idea that has impact and has the potential to bring real benefit to the community.

The Investment Portfolio generates the funds that are invested in the community. The capital comes originally from the assets of the Canterbury Savings Bank. Rātā Foundation is committed to ethical and responsible investing.

Questions/Answers

- It was suggested that Steve and Matt arrange to attend a Sounds Advisory Group meeting due to SAG's representation of small outlying community groups.
- It was clarified that projects often have more than one funding source.
- Matt and Steve noted that their intention is not to just turn up and do presentations but to communicate
 with different organisations and that they intend to continue to come and connect with groups in the
 community.
- Rātā has recently begun multi-year funding of some trusted projects.

2. Queen Charlotte Yacht Club (QCYC) Building Project Update - lan Gardiner

Ian gave a presentation to the group (Appendix 2).

Questions/Answers

- The footprint of the new building will be about the same as for the previous buildings'.
- The Council have sought QCYC's input into the upgrade of the Shelley Beach area.
- The provision for a crane to assist Access sailors (disabled) has being included in the design.
- The building is going to be 800 mm's above mean high water springs to mitigate for climate change.
- The Yacht Club can run sailing classes for adults. Get in touch for more information.

- Ian clarified that there is cooperation between QCYC and Waikawa Yacht Club with QCYC focussing on school age children and encouraging members to sail with Waikawa when they have left school.
 Waikawa assists QCYC with fundraising, event sailing and resources.
- The capacity for functions is 150 pax and it is intended that the venue will remain as an affordable option for the community.
- Building work will slow down for the sailing season and recommence in February with completion of the main part of the project forecast for August/September 2019.

Queen Charlotte Track/Link Pathway – Possibility for Economic Development – Monyeen Wedge

- Queen Charlotte Track (QCT) is on the shortlist to become a Great Walk and the Link Pathway project is
 on track to be finished during 2019, Monyeen suggested that there needs to be communication between
 the two projects and co-ordination with the Marlborough Tourism Industry.
 - CIr Taylor noted that there is co-operation between the two projects and co-ordination with the Tōtaranui 250 Project which is why Council has given additional funding to the Link Pathway to ensure it is completed by the beginning of the celebrations.
 - There is also collaboration with the Marlborough/Kaikōura Trial which will link with the Link Pathway and QCT.

4. Marlborough Sounds Community Vehicle Trust Update – Bryan Strong

- The AGM was held today.
- In the past 12 months the Trust has carried 146 passengers which is 3 times the number of passengers from the Trust's first year. There are 10 Picton drivers and 9 from Blenheim.
- The Trust is looking for a new co-ordinator. The role is voluntary and would take up to 2-3 hours spread throughout the day as phone calls could be received at any time during the day or evening. Please contact Bryan if you are interested in this role. strongsails@yahoo.co.uk

5. Payment for use of Emergency Management Centre – Mike Porter

6. General Business

Port Underwood Road - Maria Baxter

- Maria has received calls from residents over the state of the Port Underwood Road.
 - CIr Taylor noted that Wayne Boustridge is the Port Underwood contact for Marlborough Roads and residents could contact him to feed their concerns to Marlborough Roads. wayne.boustridge@hotmail.com
- It was suggested that Steve Murrin be invited to the next meeting to provide an update of the roads in the region.

Items from Previous Meeting – Jon Perano

- Jon noted that there are two items from Graham Smail's presentation at the last meeting which the Picton Museum Committee thinks need further discussion:
 - The proposed walkway which may cut up the bank through the coloured rock wall to London Quay from the I-site. Jon noted that the coloured rock wall is a part of the history of the Picton Foreshore and the Museum Committee doesn't want it altered.
 - There are concerns about the boulders that are being placed on the Victoria Domain. This could be a serious health and safety issue.
 - Clr's Taylor and Oddie are having ongoing discussions with Reserves staff about the amount of boulders appearing in Picton.

Waikawa Launching Ramp Parking- Tim Newsham

- Tim noted that the ramp is an excellent facility but that there are problems which need to be addressed with regard to the parking arrangements for trailers.
 - Hiram Taylor noted that there is a meeting with Council and the Waikawa Residents and Ratepayers Association (WRRA) to finalise the parking layout.

Wattles – Hiram Taylor

• Some progress has been made on the issues of the wattles in the hills around Picton, with working groups being formed from WRAA and Picton Smart & Connected. The groups are hopefully going to join together to work on the problem. A trial wattle control programme in a small area is expected to take place in Jan/Feb 2019.

Port Underwood Road - Ian Davis

- Logging trucks on Port Underwood Road continues to be an issue. Ian thinks that the logging trucks
 coming from the ridgeline should be encouraged to travel in convoy with a lead vehicle which is able to
 stop oncoming traffic. Maria noted that tourists are often travelling on the road unaware that they could
 meet logging trucks coming the other way. It was suggested that Steve Murrin be asked to address this
 issue at the next meeting.
 - Hiram noted that logging gang workers are travelling too fast on Port Underwood Road and there
 have been some close calls.
 - It was suggested that someone from Council come to talk to the Forum about forestry extraction projections for the area.

Matt and Steve withdrew from the meeting at 3.20 pm.

Wellness Centre Update – John Reuhman

- The concept plan has been redesigned so that the footprint fits on the existing mini-golf site.
- Funding will be applied for from the Lotteries Commission for the feasibility study.

Other Matters

- It was clarified that sea level rise is taken into consideration in all Council's future planning.
- The Cruise Ship Think Tank was held recently. A tourism town infrastructure group is going to be established in response to frustration with the presentation of Picton Township. John noted that no one from Council was present at the Cruise Ship meeting. Clr Taylor will take this feedback on staff representation back to Council.
- John was critical of the state of the Picton Foreshore at present and doesn't think it will be ready for the
 first cruise ship passengers in October. The cruise ships are expected to bring an additional 10,000
 passengers this year.
- Grahame Low is still waiting to hear back from Steve Murrin with regard to a list of road markings that need to be repainted. Rebecca agreed to email Steve about this on behalf of the PRF.






The New Facility
